Problem



- Many Locations Identified
- Many More Not Identified
- Financial Cost to the City
- Financial Cost to the Member
- Psychological Impacts



Preventive Measures



- Official Department Policy:
 - Recognition that Any Building Can be Contaminated
 - Daily Apparatus Inspection by Driver
 - Daily Living and Sleeping Quarters Inspection by All Members of the Station During Housework
 - Education on Signs of Bed Bug Infestation or Presence



Personal Hygiene



- Uniforms are Washed Separately in Hot Water and on High Heat
- Advocating Long Hot Showers
- Inspecting Personal Vehicle
- Inspecting Personal Gear and Clothing
- Awareness



Control Procedures



- First Responders and Transport Units
- Turnout Gear IS NOT TO BE WORN!
- Don New Personal Protective Suits
 - Full Coverage with Booties
 - Paper Based
 - Low Cost
- Entry of Two Members Unless Incident Requires Additional Personnel
- Do Not Set Equipment Bags on Soft Surfaces



Control Procedures



Transporting:

- When Possible Remove as Much Clothing as Respectfully as Possible
- No Extra Garments or Personal Items
- Notification of Receiving Hospital
- All Linen in Separate Bag on Arrival
- PPE Disposed of in Garbage Bag and Secured



Post Transport



- Inspect the Apparatus and Equipment
 - If No Evidence of Bed Bugs is Found:
 - Wash Uniforms in Hot Water
 - Clean Apparatus and Equipment
 - Take a Hot Shower



Post Transport



- If Bed Bugs Are Present:
 - Remain Out of Service
 - Notify the On-Duty Assistant Chief
 - Remain OOS
 - Decon
 - Disposal
 - Remove Uniform Clothing and Secure
 - Immediate Hot Shower
 - Notify EMS for Decon
